

BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

A PROCLAMATION

The vibrant culture and rich heritage of the Irish people shaped many of the earliest chapters of America's story. Our common values and shared vision for the future laid the foundation for an eternal friendship between Ireland and the United States, and today, daughters and sons of Erin continue to enrich our Nation. This month, we reaffirm the bonds of affection between our two great countries, and we honor the courage and perseverance of the Irish-American community.

From ethereal green shores, generations of Irishmen and women set out across an ocean to seek a new life in the New World. Often without family or funds, these brave souls put their faith in the ideas at the heart of our democracy — that we make our own destiny, and if we work hard and live responsibly, we can build a better future for our children and grandchildren. Early immigrants from Ireland shaped our founding documents, and in the decades and centuries since, Irish-American heroes — like the courageous members of the Fighting 69th — have fought and died to protect a Government of, by, and for the people.

Today, tens of millions of Americans proudly trace their heritage to the Emerald Isle. They are descendants of our Founding Fathers, heirs to a resilient spirit forged during the Great Hunger and painful periods of discrimination, and the latest in a long line of Irish Americans who have poured their energy and passion into perfecting our Union. With grit and determination, they have enhanced our communities, bolstered our economy, and strengthened our Nation. And their brogue continues to ring out from our halls of government and every place people strive to make our society more free, more fair, and more just.

The Irish story is one of hope and resolve — in it Americans see our own dreams and aspirations. Our pasts are bound by blood and belief, by culture and commerce, and our futures are equally, inextricably linked. During Irish-American Heritage Month, let us celebrate the people-to-people ties between our nations and continue together our work to forge a brighter tomorrow for every American and Irish child.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, BARACK OBAMA, President of the United States of America, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and the laws of the United States, do hereby proclaim March 2015 as Irish-American Heritage Month. I call upon all Americans to observe this month with appropriate ceremonies, activities, and programs.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand this twenty-seventh day of February, in the year of our Lord two thousand fifteen, and of the Independence of the United States of America the two hundred and thirty-ninth.

GRAND MARSHALS JOHN McInerney & Jack O'Brien



John McInerney and Jack O'Brien, spearheaded relentless lobbying, fundraising, and public relations efforts to gain and sustain support for a memorial honoring Commodore Barry, an Irish immigrant of County Wexford, at the United States Naval Academy (USNA).

From 2007-2014 John McInerney and Jack O'Brien

worked tirelessly in tandem to see to fruition the dedication of a memorial to Commodore Barry, First Flag Officer, United States Navy, at the Naval Academy. The planning of this memorial was watched by all of Irish-America over nearly a decade.

On December 22, 2005, the Congress passed Public Law 109-142, "The Barry Resolution" recognizing Commodore Barry as the first Flag Officer of the United States Navy. Despite this Congressional distinction, McInerney and O'Brien's formal proposals and appeals to have a memorial erected on the grounds of USNA were rejected first in 2009 and again in 2010. Undeterred, O'Brien argued the importance of remembering "How a fine officer and gentleman such as Commodore Barry can be an inspiration to future officers of the Navy and Marine Corps. We are asking that the Barry Memorial be placed in a prominent space in the Academy's Yard so that midshipmen, officers, and the public will know of the contributions of the Navy's first Flag Officer." McInerney took to the halls of Congress and AOH National President Seamus Boyle activated present and former Navy officials in Philadelphia, Commodore Barry's station in combat and final resting place.

McInerney and O'Brien's work was inspirational enough to those who witnessed it that they succeeded in raising more than \$250,000 for the project. The memorial, plaza, and gate to Commodore Barry were donated to the United States Navy and the people of the United States by the Ancient Order of Hibernians and allied Irish and Irish-American organizations. No public funds were used for the project.

While their dedication to the Barry Project would certainly be enough to merit this worthy distinction as Parade Grand Marshal, the reality is that this is only one of the large-scale projects of national significance the duo has led. In the 1990's McInerney and O'Brien were the drivers of the Irish Brigade Monument in Sharpsburg, MD, memorializing those lost from the almost exclusively Irish-American fighting units at the Battle of Antietam in September, 1862. That project, like the Barry Memorial, faced tremendous setbacks. The perseverance, resilience, and positive attitude demonstrated throughout these projects by McInerney and O'Brien in the face of challenges, uncertainty, and naysaying is a tremendous example of the outstanding historical will of Irish America.

These modern Irish-American men have gone to extraordinary lengths to memorialize outstanding Irish-Americans who shared their tenacity and values; we would do well to honor them in the highest manner possible.



John McInerney passed away unexpectedly on May 7, 2014, three days before the May 10, 2014, dedication of the memorial at USNA. His wife and strongest supporter, Louise Verret, survives him.



GRAND MARSHAL - JACK O'BRIEN

Jack O'Brien is a native Washingtonian born to Anne McCarthy O'Brien from Skibbereen, County Cork and Thomas O'Brien from Tralee, County Kerry. Jack is married to Regina O'Brien, having two children, Timothy and Stephen, three grand children, Casey O'Brien, Alexander O'Brien, and Zachary O'Brien.

He was educated at St. Martin's parish school, McKinley Technical High School and apprenticed in printing at Judd & Detweiler producers of the National Geographic magazine. As a Journeyman printer he worked at all of the Washington newspapers, The Washington Star, The Washington Post and The Washington Daily News. After his time at the DC newspapers he spent 37 years at the US Government Printing Office. As a member of Columbia Typographical Union 101, the oldest local union established in 1815, he served as Chapel Chairman, Scale committeeman, Convention Delegate and Chairman of the Red Cross blood program at the GPO.

Along with his parents who were members of the Irish American Club, his siblings Tommy, Michael & Kathleen enjoyed many socials such as moonlight cruises on the Potomac, picnics at Blob's Park, dances and participation in the original St. Patrick's parade 44 years ago, as well as all since.

Jack belonged to many Irish organizations such as the Irish American Club, Irish Cultural Society, Irish Northern Aid, Irish National Caucus, Friends of Sinn Fein, Glucksman Ireland House NYU and Ancient Order of Hibernians. Over the years Jack worked closely with Matt Hannan, Mike Mooney and John McInerney and many other supporters on Irish Cultural projects at Antietam Battlefield, Gettysburg Battlefield and the US Naval Academy in Annapolis.

The local and national Irish community supported all of the many projects without which they could not have been a reality. Thanks to all who believed it could all be accomplished!



GRAND MARSHAL - JOHN MCINERNEY

Born in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania on October 28, 1940, John McInerney was the second of six children of Irish-immigrant parents. John's father, Michael, was from Shanavogh East, County Clare and his mother, Margaret, came from Derryinver, County Galway.

He was educated at Holy Rosary School and Taylor Allderdice High in Pittsburgh. John then became a Catholic seminarian with the Society of St. Paul in Canfield, Ohio. Due to Type-I diabetes onset, John left the seminary. He studied at the University of Pittsburgh and eventually graduated from the University of Maryland. John became a history and journalism teacher at North Catholic in Pittsburgh and at two Catholic schools in the D.C. area. He later joined AARP where he worked as an administrator until retirement. His marriage to Louise Verret of New Brunswick, Canada, provided him with three decades of love and support. With Louise, John traveled to Ireland, Italy, and the Holy Land. Upon return, he would share notes and photographs with his sister Kathleen, his older brother, Patrick (d), and younger brothers Michael (d), Joseph and James. Also, John's three nephews, Jason, Michael and James, and three grand-nephews, Jason, Jeremy and Justin, benefited from John's love and friendship.

John always served. He was president of the College Station Home Owners Association for over a decade. He was a Eucharistic Minister involved in all aspects of parish life at the Holy Family Church of Mitchellville. He served as president of both the Ancient Order of Hibernians John F. Kennedy Division and the District of Columbia State Board. With his best friend, Jack O'Brien, he worked on the Irish Brigade Monument at Antietam and the restoration of Gettysburg Battlefield Memorials. Finally, with Jack, he helped achieve the John Barry Gate and Memorial Plaza at the United States Naval Academy. On May 7, 2014, John passed away at his home in Largo, Maryland, three days prior to the Barry dedication. He is buried at Notre Dame des Sept Douleurs in Edmundston, Canada.

John always loved the Washington D.C. St. Patrick's Day Parade. Being a Grand Marshal today, alongside Jack O'Brien, would have touched his Irish heart.

GAEL OF THE YEAR THERESA CULLINANE



Theresa Cullinane was born in Castleisland, County Kerry, to the late William and Mai Carmody. She has three sisters and one brother. Her sisters, along with dozens of cousins, nieces and nephews live in Ireland. Her brother and his family live in Australia.

Theresa met her husband, John, in 1958 at her home in Ireland. John, who was born in Washington DC, was visiting his grandparents and

IN MEMORY OF ALICE JOHNSON

In December 2014, the D.C. Irish community lost one of its most memorable members, Alice Johnson of Riverdale, Maryland. Born Alice Murphy in Tullahaught, County. Kilkenny, Ireland, she maintained a home there and visited as often as possible. Alice was a nurse who used her caring manner and skills to serve patients as diverse as soldiers returning from Dunkirk during World War II and sick and dying in nursing homes, hospitals and private homes. She arrived in the United States in 1947 following World War II as the young bride of Ralph Johnson, an American soldier whom she met in London. They settled in the Washington, D.C. area in 1952

For six decades, Alice was a model of Irish spirit and strength in the Washington, D.C. Irish Community. She volunteered for and held leadership posts in the Irish American Club, the Ladies Auxiliary of the Ancient Order of Hibernians, and of course the St. Patrick's Parade Committee of Washington, D.C. She has the distinction of being one of the organizers of the first St. Patrick's Parade in D.C. 44 years ago. She was honored as our Gael of the Year in 2001 and again as a Division Marshal in 2008. Alice held the annual record for selling fundraising raffle tickets for the St. Patrick's Parade Committee.

For years Alice was also a "Godmother" to the young Irish who come to the United States, hosting them in her home, helping them

to find jobs and friends, and of course encouraging them to become active in Irish organizations and events. Her active involvement with St. Bernard's Church including her involvement with the Sodality continued unabated for years. Alice had an extraordinary ripple effect on the Irish community in our area. Her children and grandchildren can attest to her good humor, eloquent storytelling, and, yes, her famous Irish soda bread and scones.

Alice will be missed by all.

Saint Patrick, the patron saint of Ireland, was born in Britain. He was captured and taken to Ireland as a slave as a boy. He escaped after six years, but returned to Ireland as a missionary in his 30's. His mission in Ireland lasted thirty years: establishing monasteries, setting up schools, and building churches. St. Patrick's Day is celebrated on the date of his death, March 17, 461.

There are only two surviving written documents, both letters, that are credited to Saint Patrick. One is an account of his life and his work with the Church. Known as the "Declaration," this letter describes the vision that told him to go back to Ireland. The second letter was written to the soldiers of Coroticus informing them that Patrick was excommunicating soldiers who raided Ireland and took citizens into slavery.

Legend credits St. Patrick with using the native shamrock to teach the Irish about the Doctrine of the Holy Trinity. Green was worn in reference to the shamrock in honor of St. Patrick as early as the 17th century, though St. Patrick's vestments were blue.





The robes and ribbons of the Order of Saint Patrick, established in 1783 as the senior order of chivalry in Ireland, are also blue. The modern Irish coat of arms and the standard of the President of Ireland, is a golden harp with silver strings on a royal blue background.
