BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.

A PROCLAMATION

For more than two centuries, America has been made and remade by striving, hopeful immigrants looking for a chance to pursue their dreams. Millions among them were born in Ireland, separated from our shores but united by their belief in a better day. This month, we celebrate the Irish-American journey, and we reflect on the ways a nation so small has inspired so much in another.

Generations of Irish left the land of their forebears to cast their fortunes with a young Republic. Escaping the blight of famine or the burden of circumstance, many found hardship even here. They endured prejudice and stinging ridicule. But through it all, these new citizens never gave up on one of our oldest ideas: that anyone from anywhere can write the next great chapter in the American story. So they raised families and built communities, earned a living and sent their kids to school. In time, what it means to be kish helped define what it means to be American. And as they did their part to make this country stronger, Irish Americans shared in its success, retaining the best of their heritage and passing it down to their children.

That familiar story has been lived and cherished by Americans from all backgrounds, and it reaffirms our identity as a Nation of immigrants from all around the world. So as we celebrate Irish-American Heritage Month, let us rotell those stories of sweat and striving. And as two nations united by people and principle, may America and ireland always continue to move forward together in common purpose.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, BARACK OBAMA, President of the United States of America, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and the laws of the United States, do hereby proclaim March 2013 as Irish-American Heritage Month. I call upon all Americans to observe this month with appropriate ceremonies, activities, and programs.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand this twenty-eighth day of February, in the year of our Lord two thousand thirteen, and of the Independence of the United States of America the two hundred and thirty-seventh.

GRAND MARSHAL ADMIRAL MIKE MULLEN, USN (RET)

Admiral Mike Mullen is a native of Los Angeles California and third generation Irish-American. His great grandmother hails from the Parish of Kiltullagh in County Roscommon.

He attended the U.S. Naval Academy on a basketball scholarship graduating in 1968.



After graduation, he served aboard the destroyer USS COLLETT which took part in combat operations off the coast of Vietnam. During his career, Admiral Mullen held leadership positions aboard six other warships, including command of the USS GEORGE WASHINGTON Strike Group. He has a Master of Science degree in Operations Research, and completed the Advanced Management Program at the Harvard Business School.

Admiral Mullen served as the 17th Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, the President's principal military advisor, from October, 2007 until September, 2011. From 2005 to 2007, Admiral Mullen was the 28th Chief of Naval Operations, the Navy's highest ranking officer.



As Chairman of the Joint Chiefs, he was instrumental in integrating Special Operations forces into U.S. military activities, including presiding over the military's role in targeting Osama Bin Laden. He guided the U.S. Armed Forces through difficult phases in both the Afghanistan and Iraq wars, and oversaw humanitarian operations from Haiti to Japan.



GRAND MARSHAL ADMIRAL MIKE MULLEN, USN (RET)

He built critical relationships with some of the most complex actors in the international community such as Russia, China and Pakistan. Admiral Mullen's dedication to the diversity and integrity of the U.S. Armed Forces informed his decision to support repeal of the Don't Ask, Don't Tell policy.

Passionate about the health and welfare of our troops and military families, as well as their connection to the American public, he and his wife, Deborah, continue to devote much of their time to advancing important support initiatives, including survivor benefits, suicide prevention, mental health, wounded care, homelessness, and veteran employment and education.

For his outstanding military service to our Nation and continued dedication to support those who serve, the St. Patrick's Parade Committee of Washington, D.C. is proud to honor Admiral Mullen as the 2013 Grand Marshal.



GAEL OF THE YEAR COLONEL J.J. KELLY, USA (RET)

John Joseph (J.J.) Kelly was born in Dover, NJ, and raised in Rockaway, NJ. He attended the United States Military Academy in West Point, New York and was commissioned upon graduation. He currently resides in Springfield, Virginia, with his wife of 47 years, the former Kaye Rasmessen. They have three children and seven grandchildren.



J.J.'s great grandparents, John Francis Kelly and Catherine Geany were young children when they emigrated from County Cavan and New Castle West, County Limerick in the mid-1800's. They met in Boonton, NJ, and were married there. John Francis and Catherine went west, looking for gold, but were robbed of most of the gold they had found on their way back to New Jersey.

Throughout his 25+ year military career J.J. served in overseas assignments in Germany, Belgium, Vietnam, and Korea. Stateside posts included Fort Sill, OK; El Paso, TX; Fort Hood, TX; Norfolk, VA; and The Pentagon, Washington, DC, attaining the rank of Colonel. His personal decorations include the Defense Superior Service Medal, Bronze Star, Purple Heart, Meritorious Service Medal with two Oak Leaf Clusters, Joint Service Commendation Medal, Army Commendation Medal, and Air Force Commendation Medal.

Community service is a large part of J.J.'s life. He has been active in the Knights of Columbus for over 25 years, having served as Grand Knight for two separate councils, and had two separate terms as District Deputy. He is a Knight in the Equestrian Order of the Holy Sepulchre of Jerusalem and is the Executive Secretary of the



Ballyshaners, Inc. Nonprofit organization, sponsors of the Alexandria, Virginia, St. Patrick's Day Parade and the Alexandria Irish Festival.

His involvement in the Ancient Order of Hibernians (AOH) began in 1982, spanning over 25 years of involvement at Division, State and National level. He was State President from 2003 to 2005. He now serves the Order as National Chairman for Veterans Affairs, working to help in any way possible, those veterans from past, current and future wars and conflicts.

The AOH is the oldest and largest Irish Catholic organization in the United States. The AOH holds annual dances, concerts, and parades sponsored at all levels of the Order raise millions for charity while providing a showcase for the positive contributions the Irish have made in every walk of American life. Divisions and Hibernian Halls across the country have traditionally provided a welcome for new immigrants.

For his dedication to supporting and helping our troops at home and abroad, the St. Patrick's Parade Committee of Washington, D.C., is proud to honor Colonel J.J. Kelly (Ret) as our 2013 Gael of the Year.



DID YOU KNOW?

There were several Irishmen in Christopher Columbus crew. But the one who stands out most is Patrick Maguire. In 1492, Irish-born Maguire was the first crew member of Christopher Columbus' to set foot on North American ground.

DIVISION MARSHAL - KATIE LEDECKY



Olympic Gold Medalist swimmer Kathleen (Katie) Ledecky was born with the luck of the Irish on St. Patrick's Day in 1997 in Washington, D.C. Katie was named after her Irish grandmother, Kathleen O'Connor Hagan, and her Irish aunt, Mary Kathleen Keogh, and today is Katie's 16th birthday.

Katie is a graduate of the Little Flower Catholic School in her home town of Bethesda, and is currently an honors student as a sophomore in high school at the Stone Ridge School of the Sacred Heart.

Katie began swimming year-round at age 6 and was soon recognized as one of the area's finest young swimmers, winning the Potomac Valley Swimming Outstanding Athlete award for five consecutive years. At the age of 15, Katie won a race at the U.S. Olympic Trials held in Omaha, Nebraska, which qualified her to swim the 800 Meter Freestyle event at the 2012 Olympic Games held in London last August. Katie not only became the youngest member of the United States Olympic swim team, she became the youngest American athlete to participate in any sport at the 2012 Summer Olympics.

In her Olympic event, Katie faced a tall order in that she had to swim against the defending Olympic and world champion in the 800 Meter Freestyle, 23-year old veteran distance swimmer Rebecca Adlington of

Great Britain who was swimming before her home crowd and with British royals in attendance. With youthful exuberance and pluck, Katie took the race out fast and never looked back. She swam her race so fast that she won by more than four seconds, breaking the American record in the event which had been set by legendary Olympic champion Janet Evans in 1989, eight years before Katie was born. Katie became the youngest swimmer ever to win the 800 Meter Freestyle event at the Olympics and became the second youngest American swimmer ever to win a Gold Medal at the Olympics.

Katie's remarkable Gold Medal swim was recognized by USA Swimming and the USA Swimming Foundation as both the "Performance of the Year" and the "Breakout Performance of the Year", in a year in which the U.S. Olympic team had what many consider its finest Olympics ever, garnering a total of 31 medals.

Katie hopes to continue to swim in major national and international swimming competitions. In December 2012, Katie followed up her Olympic performance by capturing the U.S. short course national titles in the 500 Yard Freestyle and the 1650 Yard Freestyle, and led her local swim club (the Nation's Capital Swim Club) to a National Team Championship. Katie has been named to the U.S. National Swim team, is the holder of numerous National Age Group records and Potomac Valley Swimming Age Group Records, and continues to swim with her high school swim team.

For her Olympic accomplishments representing the United States, the St. Patrick's Parade Committee of Washington, D.C. is proud to honor Katie as a 2013 Division Marshal.









DIVISION MARSHAL COLONEL DOUGLAS C. DILLARD, USA (RET)



Colonel Dillard currently holds the office of National President, Veterans of the Battle of the Bulge Association, Inc. He also is President of the 551st Parachute Infantry Battalion Association of WWII.

Colonel Dillard entered the service as an enlisted man on July 3, 1942. He received basic training, then Parachute training at Fort Benning, GA, and was deployed to Panama for an airborne operation to capture the island of Martinique. His battalion returned to the US and retrained for European warfare, then deployed to Italy. His unit jumped into Southern France on August 14, 1944, and was the first unit to capture a German Major General in his command post.

After the Southern France campaign, his unit moved to Northern France and was assigned to the XVIII Airborne Corps and attached to the 82nd Airborne Division. The Unit participated in the Battle of the Bulge where it was destroyed by German artillery and small arms fire

while engaged in continuous attacks from January 3-8 January, 1945. Colonel Dillard's unit was awarded the Presidential Unit Citation for its combat heroism in the Battle of the Bulge.

When the war ended Colonel Dillard had progressed through the ranks to become 1st Sgt of his company. Colonel Dillard remained in the Army and served in the 82nd Airborne

Division, then Korea where he worked behind the Chinese Lines with Korean Partisans, then service in Vietnam with the IV Corps Military Advisory Group in the Mekong Delta. Colonel Dillard served on active duty for 35 years, in both the Infantry and Military Intelligence Branches. He retired in September 1977.

He holds many awards from the US Army, Department of Defense, Korea and France. He is a graduate of the University of Maryland with a Bachelors Degree, Boston University with a Master Degree and was a PH.D. candidate at the Catholic University of America. He has been inducted into the Military Intelligence Hall of Fame and has the Order of St. Maurice, rank of Centurian from the National Infantry Association and is a master parachutist with the Combat Infantry Badge with Silver Star.

For his outstanding service to the United States of America and for keeping America aware of the sacrifice of our veterans, the St. Patrick's Parade Committee of Washington, D.C. is proud to honor Colonel Dillard (Ret) as a 2013 Division Marshal.





DIVISION MARSHAL COLONEL WILLIAM R. HALPIN, USA (RET)



Bill is a retired U.S. Army infantry and intelligence officer with experience at all levels from Special Forces Operational Detachment Alpha in Vietnam to theater and national headquarters including service as an Army Attaché and brigade-level commander.

After six years on active duty, he spent the balance of a 31-year career in the Army Reserve, at various times assigned to the Joint Special Operations Agency, the US Special Operations Command, the US European Command, the Defense Intelligence Agency, and the Army Intelligence and Security Command. He was inducted into the Infantry School Hall of Fame, received numerous awards for meritorious service and combat heroism, including the prestigious Knowlton Award for Career Excellence. He retired as a Colonel (0-6). After leaving active duty, Bill served in a specialized Army program for nearly three decades, including 20 years at posts overseas. Later, he held the Wilson Chair for Intelligence Studies at the National Intelligence University and taught at CIA, DIA, NSA, and Senior Service Colleges. He has been published in the Defense Intelligence Journal and CIA's Studies in Intelligence.

Bill is a Rhode Island native and third generation Irish-American. He joined the Ancient Order of Hibernians in 1985 during a three-year assignment in the Washington area. As a Hibernian, he has served on multiple committees and held numerous elected offices, including six years as the President of two Virginia Divisions, first in Loudoun County and today in Fredericksburg. At the state level, he served on the Virginia AOH State Board as State Historian, State Treasurer, and he is the Veterans Affairs Chairman. He was honored to be selected as Virginia's Hibernian of the Year in 2003 and received the Virginia AOH St Columcille award in 2011.



DIVISION MARSHAL COLONEL WILLIAM R. HALPIN, USA (RET)

As Veterans Affairs Chair, he is collaborating with others to fund and erect a memorial to Irish nationals who died in active service to the US Armed Forces in the Vietnam War. This memorial, to be erected in Ennis, County Clare, Ireland, will contain the names and dates of service of Irish men and women who served and lost their lives in Southeast Asia. The project is being undertaken in cooperation with the Ennis Town council. The plan is to dedicate the memorial on November 11, 2013, as part of The Gathering Ireland 2013.

As a member of the Society for the Study of Nineteenth Century Ireland, Bill presented a paper on Fenian Brotherhood activities in Europe 1866-71 at Queens University Belfast in the north of Ireland. He has contributed to several books pertaining to Irish and Irish-Americans in the U.S. Civil War and is completing the biography of General William G. Halpin, an Irish immigrant, Civil War regimental commander, and leader in the Fenian Brotherhood.

Bill completed his undergraduate degree at Bryant University, graduate degree at Boston University, and is a graduate of the Armed Forces Staff College and the U.S. Army War College. He also completed national intelligence and security policy programs at Harvard University, the Federal Executive Institute, and the Department of State.

In recognition of his service to the United States of America and documenting Irish and Irish American history, the St. Patrick's Parade Committee of Washington, D.C. is proud to honor Colonel William Halpin, USA (ret) as a 2013 Division Marshal.

St. Patrick, the patron saint of Ireland, was born in Britain. He was captured and taken to Ireland as a slave as a boy. He escaped after six years, but returned to Ireland as a missionary in his 30's. His mission in Ireland lasted thirty years: establishing monasteries, setting up schools, and building churches. St. Patrick's Day is celebrated on the date of his death, March 17, 461AD.

There are only two surviving written documents, both letters, that are credited to Saint Patrick. One is an account of Saint Patrick's life and his work with the church. Known as the "Declaration", this letter describes the vision that told him to go back to Ireland. The second letter was written to the soldiers of Coroticus informing them that Patrick was excommunicating soldiers who raided Ireland and took citizens into slavery.

Legend credits St. Patrick with using the native shamrock to teach the Irish about the doctrine of the Holy Trinity. Green was worn in reference to the shamrock in honor of St. Patrick as early as the 17th century, though St. Patrick's vestments were blue.





The robes and ribbons of the Order of Saint Patrick, established in 1783 as the senior order of chivalry in Ireland, are also blue. The modern Irish coat of arms and the standard of the President of Ireland, is a golden harp with silver strings on a royal blue background.

The Committee extends its thanks to the D.C. Police Emerald Society for volunteering their time to work behind the scenes to marshal the parade. We can't step-off without you!






DID YOU KNOW?
