Welcome to the 35th anniversary of the Nation's St. Patrick's Day Parade.



PRESIDENT'S PROCLAMATION



A Proclamation by the President of the United States of America

The story of the Irish in America is an important part of the history of our country. This month, we pay tribute to Americans of Irish descent who have shaped our Nation and influenced American life.

Long before the great wave of Irish immigration in the 1840s, people of Irish ancestry were defining and defending our Nation. Charles Thomson, an Irishman by birth, served as Secretary of the Continental Congress and helped design the Great Seal of the United States. Irish-born Commodore John Barry fought for our country's independence and later helped found the United States Navy.

Irish Americans have been leaders in our public life, and they have obtained a just reverence for their heritage. In June 1963, President John F. Kennedy spoke to the Parliament in Dublin and told the story of the Irish Brigade, a regiment that fought valiantly for the Union and suffered terrible losses during the Civil War. Two decades after President Kennedy's visit, President Ronald Reagan returned to his great grandfather's hometown in County Tipperary, Ireland, and greeted the crowd in their own Irish language.

The industry, talent, and imagination of Irish Americans have enriched our commerce and our culture. Their strong record of public service has fortified our democracy. Their strong ties to family, faith, and community have strengthened our Nation's character. The Irish are a significant reason why Americans will always be proud to call ourselves a Nation of immigrants.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, GEORGE W. BUSH, President of the United States of America, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and laws of the United States, do hereby proclaim March 2003 as Irish American Heritage Month. I call upon all Americans to observe this month by celebrating the contributions of Irish Americans to our Nation.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand this fourth day of March, in the year of our Lord two thousand five, and of the Independence of the United States of America the two hundred and twenty-ninth.

Susan O'Malley

She is arguably the most powerful female executive in professional sports. The Saint Patrick's Day Parade Committee is pleased to honor Susan O'Malley as the Grand Marshal for our 2006 Parade.

O'Malley was born and grew up in Maryland with her parents, Janice and Peter O'Malley and her four brothers and sisters. Her father, a lawyer for Abe Pollin, owner of the Bullets basketball team and the Capitals hockey team, used to bring young Susan to the games. Hanging around the arena, O'Malley knew from the age of eleven that sports was the kind of work she wanted to do.

She began to build a career by trying to play basketball—but her gym teacher suggested she get a desk job instead! Switching her aspirations while still in grade school, she wrote a paper declaring her goal was to run a sports franchise. The teacher awarded her a good grade but cautioned that the young girl's goal was "not very realistic."

(Her teacher probably didn't know that O'Malley traces her roots back to Grace O'Malley of County Mayo, legendary pirate of the seas, seafarer, trader and chieftain in Ireland in the 1500's. As a young child, Grace knew she wanted to be a sailor but her ambitions were dismissed. Upset when her sea captain father refused to take her on a sailing trip, she cut off all her hair and dressed in boys' clothes to prove she was willing to live a sailor's life. Her father, impressed by her persistence, began to bring her on trading missions overseas. She spent her young life learning the ways of the sea and grew up to be a sailor—eventually having her own fleet of ships. In her later life, Grace

took up piracy by taking on Turkish and Spanish pirate ships and even the English fleets. She grew her estate to include several islands and castles on the west coast of Ireland. In her 70 years of life, she and her family saw the English rule spreading throughout Ireland, but due to her strength and leadership her clan and those around

her were mostly unaffected by it. It is said that from the year of her death in 1600 and onward, no tribal chieftain had been able to preserve the old Gaelic way of life as had Grace O'Malley in her lifetime.)

O'Malley attended Mount St. Mary's College in northern Maryland and graduated in 1983 with a Bachelor of Science degree in business and finance. While still in college, she served as an intern with the Bullets and the Caps. After graduation, heeding advice to gain experience elsewhere and come back to the team mid-level, she worked for the Eagle Palmer Brown Advertising firm for three years. In 1986, she returned to the Bullets as director of advertising. A year later, O'Malley became director of marketing and then executive vice president of the Bullets. In 1991, at the age of twenty-nine, she was named president of the Bullets, becoming the first female president of an NBA franchise as well as president of a multi-faceted sports and entertainment company.

After being named President, O'Malley focused on improving relationships with ticket holders, corporate sponsors, and the media. Consequently, the team experienced the largest ticket revenue year in the history of the franchise. That same year, the club achieved the highest

Walter Durkan

The St. Patrick's Day Parade Committee of Washington, D.C. is proud to honor Walter E. Durkan as its 2006 Gael of the Year.

Walter is an integral part of the Irish American community in the Washington, D.C. area. He has served three terms as president of Washington, D.C.'s Irish American Club and continues to actively participate in it. He's a strong advocate for the organization and encourages local Irish Americans interested in belonging to contact him at celine2@verizon.net. Durkan is actively involved in numerous other cultural and charitable programs including his efforts to fundraise for victims of Hurricane Katrina. Many Irish American and community groups have called on Durkan over the years to lend his Midas touch in support of local youth soccer and various programs which cultivate Irish heritage.

Walter is the sixth of seven children, four girls and three boys, born to Kathleen and Walter J. Durkan in County Armagh, Northern Ireland. His father's family lived in the town of Cornewee in County Mayo and his mother's ancestors hailed from County Armagh, where he attended primary and high school under the expert guidance of the Patrician Brothers. During this time young Durkan made deliveries twice a day on his milk route without compromising academic performance was an avid sportsman and gifted Gaelic football and soccer player throughout his school years. His love of sport continued with several local clubs upon his graduation. Walter combined his athletic activities with a position for a local solicitor as a paralegal preparing wills and other documents.

Durkan's personal, professional and athletic achieve-



ments demonstrate a strong sense of enthusiasm, spirit and commitment. Walter and his wife Marie first met in her hometown of Ballybay, where she was a school teacher and he was playing league football. In hopes of a more prosperous future, Durkan came to the United States in the midst of the 1967 economic recession, first living with his uncle in Arlington, Virginia. Within three weeks Durkan accepted a job with an electrical distributor-

ship in Rosslyn, Virginia. He progressed rapidly learning many facets of the business. This prepared him well for a 1966 offer from the multi-national electrical manufacturing corporation, Cutler-Hammer. This company distributes a wide variety of medium and high voltage electrical equipment for the utility and industrial markets including distribution transformers, capacitors, voltage regulators, reclosers, switches, etc. Walter advanced quickly as a sales executive during the next 31 years, before retiring in 1997.

Walter Durkan and Marie Neve Moen of County Monaghan married in 1963 at Saint Thomas More Church in Arlington. The Durkans have three children: Brendan, Ann-Marie and Clara plus six grandchildren. Their oldest son Brendan serves as an airborne ranger attached to a Special Forces unit in Georgia. He and his wife Amanda have three children: Sean (17), Kevin (15) and Kaitlyn (8) and their middle child Ann-Marie and her husband Carlos have two children: Tierney (7) and Declan (3). Their youngest, the former "Rose of Tralee" of Washington, DC in 1989, Clara and husband Butch have one son Seamus.

Durkan played Gaelic football as a young man for County

Flaherty attended St. Teresa's grade school and Oxon Hill High School. During his youth he was active in the Boy Scouts and attained the rank of Eagle Scout. He joined the Oxon Hill Volunteer Fire Department where he was 26 years old. A few years later he was appointed to the DCFD, where he worked for 23 years. Flaherty is a member of the Emerald Society and has been involved with the group in DC since its inception. While working on the Fire Department in 1970's, Flaherty traveled to NYC, with Dennis Murphy to learn what it would take to start an Emerald Society in the Nation's Capitol. When they returned flyers were sent around to see if there was any interest and with in a few weeks they had

For Culkin Irish Dancers, D.C. ST. Patrick's Day Parade is Important Part of a Busy Season

While black and white may not seem to be traditional St. Patrick's Day colors, for the students of the Culkin School of Traditional Irish Dance, putting on their black and white school parade uniform for the 10-block march down Constitution Avenue is a sure sign that the holiday season is in full swing.

The Culkin School currently enrolls nearly 500 students and is an active member of the Washington, D.C. and Baltimore Irish-American communities. The black and white school colors honor the Culkin family's County Sligo heritage.

Founded by Sean Culkin in 1997, the Culkin School has been a D.C. parade participant since 1999, but the school's roots go back even further.

Three of the school's certified instructors - Culkin, Caterina Earle and Bridget Launi - were students of the late Peggy O'Neill, a long-time instructor in the Washington, D.C. area and member of the Irish Cultural Hall of Fame. With the addition of Nicki Sack Elliott, a native of Pittsburgh, the school has built the largest teaching staff in the region.

"One of my goals for the school is to share Irish dance with our community by participating in events like the Washington, D.C. St. Patrick's Day Parade," said Culkin. "It's one of the many things that Peggy taught me - to be involved in the community."

Since its inception, the Culkin School has worked to preserve the unique traditions of Irish dance through classes, performances and

competition. Currently, classes are held in Washington, D.C., Rockville, Bethesda, Kensington, Arbutus and Silver Spring for beginners through adults.

"Our mission is to pass on the tradition of Irish Dance, teach the basics of dance and the music it is danced to, and to have fun while we learn," added Nicki Elliott. "We also want prepare our students who wish to compete, so that they can do so to the best of their ability."

That preparation is continuing to pay off. In the last seven years, the Culkin School has held 12 regional championship titles in both solo and team dancing and has qualified dancers for the World Irish Dance Championships 26 times.

This year, four dancers from the Culkin School are on

their way to Belfast, Northern Ireland to compete in the 2006 world championships. Kate Bole, 29, of Alexandria, Phillip Stacy, 16, of Silver Spring, Kelly Anne McGovern, 13, of Silver Spring, and Cierra O'Keeffe, 12, of Sykesville, will travel to the Oireachtas Rince Na Crann, which is being held April 9-16, 2006. Two-dancers, Phillip and Cierra, competed in the 2005 World Championships. Kate and Kelly will be competing at the Worlds for the first time, though both dancers have previously qualified for the competition multiple times.

In addition to qualifying four students for the World championships, at the Southern Regional Championships this past December in Dallas, Texas, which included schools from 15 states, 13 Culkin dancers qualified for the North American Irish Dance Championships, which will be held June 28 - July 2 in San Diego, California.

"We're extremely proud of our students and excited that they have this opportunity to compete at such a high level," said Culkin.

Success for the school and its dancers isn't limited to the competition stage. One of the school's dancers, Jenny O'Connell, is currently touring with Riverdance. And, for the first time in 2006, the Culkin School kicked off the St. Patrick's Day season with a full-length 90-minute showcase performance. Reels, Jigs & Hornpipes: A Celebration of Irish Dance debuted on March 3 at Rockville's P. Scott Fitzgerald Theatre.

However, the highlight of the season is likely to be a headline performance at the Kennedy Center's Millennium Stage on St. Patrick's night, March 17 at 6:00 p.m.

"I've always told our students to dance like they were onstage at the Kennedy Center and one day they might get there," said Culkin. "So, we're thrilled to be returning to the Kennedy Center's Millennium Stage to help them celebrate St. Patrick's Day."

The Kennedy Center performance will feature a wide range of traditional and contemporary Irish dances performed by students from the Culkin School and choreo-

graphed by the school's instructors.

In addition to the Kennedy Center, the school has performed at the White House, the National Theatre (with the Trinity Irish Dance Company), the Irish Embassy Residence, Strathmore and at Wolf Trap National Park, and has also performed with many internationally renowned musicians, including the Chieftains, Cherish the Ladies, Eileen Ivers, Lunasa and Natalie MacMaster.

Cullkin students have also been seen at many area festivals, including the Potomac Celtic Festival, the Maryland Renaissance Festival, the Washington Irish Festival and the Baltimore Irish Festival.

While the majority of students at the school are elementary, junior high and high school students, the Cullkin

School is also home to the largest adult Irish dance program in the region and one of the largest in the country. The school's adult celtic teams have won six regional championship titles in the last two years. Dancers include those new to Irish dance, as well as those who danced as children or teens, and range in age from 18 to "60-something."

"Irish dance requires effort, both physical and mental, teamwork and time. In my experience as a dancer and, now, as a teacher, I find that adults meet the challenge with a special enthusiasm and dedication" said Caterina Earle, who teaches beginning adult students.

The Ancient Gaelic Sport of Hurling by William Murphy

Come March 17, many Americans and others around the world will don green clothes, dive on corned beef and cabbage, and quench their thirst with a pint of Guinness Stout. Such rituals are part of the annual St. Patrick's Day celebration of all things Irish.

But how many of us will thrill to the grace of an athlete as he hurls the sliothar (ball) into the net for the winning goal? Or cheer battling footballers as they hand-pass and kick their way up the pitch?

The Gaelic sports of hurling and football, whose seasons are now underway, are authentic Ireland. Fast, rough, and exciting, they're great sport, but also something more. Gaelic athletics are a heartfelt Irish passion, and a physical celebration of ancient traditions and culture. While Gaelic football is an old sport, hurling is ancient. Irish mythology is replete with tales of heroes who were expert hurliers. Such myths point to a hurling history some 2,000 years old and explain the sport's prominent place in Irish culture.

One of the earliest, and most famous, references to hurling comes from a 12th century document which tells the story of legendary warrior Cu Chulainn, and clearly mentions the wood Cuirass, which is Gaelic for hurley, the stick used in the game. Cu Chulainn (originally named Setanta) was one of the greatest Irish mythological heroes, and the nephew of King Conor of Ulster. He left home as a young boy, intent on joining the Red Branch Knights in Emain Macha, where his uncle ruled. He arrived at the court to find over 150 youths playing Caomán (hurling). Setanta, who had brought his red wooden hurley, outplayed the other youths and gained the attention of his uncle's court. His uncle was so impressed that he invited Setanta to join the Red Branch Knights and sent him off to warrior school. Setanta acquired the name "Cu Chulainn", the Hound of Chulainn, after he famously defeated a vicious wolfhound by hitting his ball through the hound's mouth with his hurley.

References to hurling are also found in the Beibon Laws of 500 B.C. King Cahir's will mentions 50 brass hurleys and 50 brass hurley balls. The game was outlawed by the Statute of Kilkenny in 1367, which were designed to keep the Irish peasantry isolated from their English Norman rulers. (The Statute also banned Anglo-Irish marriages; speaking Irish;

and adopting Irish customs, laws, names, or clothing.)

Hurling proved to be too popular with all classes of society, however, and it was not effectively outlawed until the Galway Statutes of 1527. These Statutes forbade the playing of "hooke", a stick and ball game, probably because of the violence and disorder that often accompanied the games. Other games were also forbidden "except alone football with the gate ball". Thus, Gaelic Football became the island's most popular sport, and it remains so today.

Despite those prohibitions, by the 18th century, 21-a-side games were being played between Ireland's counties. In 1828, a South East Hurling Championship was played between Ballygarvan, Douglas, Ringaskiddy, Skryne, Tralee and Carrigaline – as recounted in two ballads ("The Carrigaline Goaleys Defeated" and "The Victorious Goaleys of Carrigaline and Killarney").

In 1879, the Irish Hurling Union was founded at Dublin's Trinity College, based on rules drafted by the Dublin University Hurling Club in 1878. In 1882, Michael Cusack founded the Dublin Hurling Club. Hurling's rules were standardized in the 1880s by the Gaelic Athletic Association (GAA), which led to the development of hurling and hurley (hockey) as separate sports. The first hurling game played under GAA rules occurred in February, 1883 in Killarney; the All-Ireland Hurling Finals were first played on April 1, 1887.

During the 19th century, large scale Irish emigration spread the popularity of hurling and Gaelic football across the world, establishing the game in America, Australia and Canada. Related games played in the British Isles include Scottish shinty, Welsh bandy and hockey.

The Maple School of Irish dance was pleased to pay tribute to the ancient sport of hurling by incorporating the history of Cu Chulainn into a choreographed dance drama. They performed the drama at the Southern Region Oireachtas in Dallas, Texas in December 2005.

Mark P. Quinn, RIP (1941-2005)

In the Irish music community in Washington, Mark Quinn was an institution.

When I first arrived here from New York in the mid-60s to attend graduate school, I didn't like it here at all. There was no Irish music to be had as far as I could see. I would hitchhike up to the Bronx almost every weekend to hang out with my brother Terry and my old neighborhood buddies. But I slowly got to know the area a little better and then someone told me about Matt Kane's Bit o' Ireland Pub on 13th Street. The first time I wandered down there, I met Mark. We hit it off right away, both of us being from New York and having a lot in common. But most of all, I had found the music and it was coming from Mark's big red accordion. I think that's when I decided to stay — and when Terry came down for a visit, I brought him over to Kane's to meet Mark as well. As Terry said in an article he wrote for the *Washingtonian* a couple of years ago, Mark "was proof that the Irish and their music were likely to turn up anywhere."

Mark was a rock solid musician who had great "fun" in his playing. He loved to play waltzes and polkas but he had plenty of other tunes as well. He loved getting up on stage to perform. He was a natural entertainer who knew how to work a crowd. And always had some great scheme planned to bring Irish music to the masses (and make a lot of money in the process).

Eventually, more Irish pubs opened, and more Irish music could be heard. There were parties, especially around St Patrick's Day, and the celtic scene was starting to take hold. More than likely, you would find Mark at many of these places and events.



Mark, Lou Thompson, Peggy Riordan, Alan Mackel, Terry and I eventually wound up playing together in the Blackthorn and later Garyswim celtic bands.

A few years after that, when Celtic Thunder recorded its first album, we put a set of tunes on it that we learned from Mark and called them "Mark Quinn's Polkas." Mark got a great kick out of that since he had learned the tunes from Billy McCormiskey.

I also have to note that Mark liked to change his outward appearance from time to time. He would grow a long scraggly beard and keep it for a while but then the next time you'd see him the beard would be gone as would most of his hair. He would shave everything visible. And then grow it all back.

On the home front, Mark loved his family and frequently spoke fondly about his daughters and how well they did in school and how successful they were becoming on their own. He was very proud of them and he let you know it.

Mark had a mischievous spirit, an infectious sense of humor, and a deep appreciation for the music he loved. It was always a treat when he showed up for a party or a gig, and wasted no time in taking out his ban and getting the music off the ground. We don't have him with us anymore. We have only the memory now of the fun we had together, along with the laughs and the great music he brought to us all, and we're thankful at least for that. He was one of a kind and we won't see the likes of Mark Quinn again.





Early Irish American Olympic Champions

The first very first Olympic champion in the modern era was crowned in the triple jump, in the 1896 Athens Games to an Irish American Harvard student James Connolly. On 6 April 1896, James Connolly won the triple jump (then two hops and a jump), and thus became the first Olympic champion in 1527 years. He also placed second in the high jump and third in the long jump. A 27-year-old undergraduate student, Connolly dropped out of Harvard University and traveled to Athens by freighter and train, arriving the day before the Olympics began. Connolly later became a well-known journalist and novelist and was offered an honorary doctorate by Harvard, which he turned down.

Irish-born John Flanagan was already the world record holder for the hammer throw when he immigrated to the United States in 1890. Like so many champion weight throwers during that era, he became a policeman in New York City and represented the US in international sporting events.

At the 1900 Paris Olympics, Flanagan won the hammer throw easily, outdistancing fellow American Triston Harr by 4.75m. Four years later, at the St. Louis Olympics, in an competition devoid of foreign entries, Flanagan successfully defended his title, although he was given a good test by Julius DeWitt, and won by less than a metre. A week later, Flanagan picked up a silver medal in the 56-pound (25.4-kg) weight throw. At the 1908 London Games, Flanagan overcame world record holder Matt McGrath with his last attempt to win his third straight hammer throw gold medal. He also competed in the tug-of-war. On 24 July 1909, Flanagan threw the hammer 26.25m to become the oldest world record breaker in the history of athletics. He was 41 years, 196 days old. Flanagan returned to Ireland in 1913

and lived there until his death in 1938.

An Irish-American policeman, Matt McGrath first competed in the Olympic hammer throw event in 1908. At the time, he was the reigning world record holder. But, at the London Games, he was beaten by another Irish-American policeman, two-time defending Olympic champion John Flanagan. However, at the 1912 Stockholm Olympics, McGrath overwhelmed his opponents. The shortest of his six throws was 4.45m longer than anyone else's longest throw. McGrath's Olympic record held up for 24 years. In 1936, McGrath tried to defend his title, but injured his knee and had to withdraw after his second throw. He still managed to finish fifth. In 1934, McGrath returned to the Olympics and earned the silver medal at the age of 45.

Another Irish-American Olympian was Eddie Eagan. Eddie Eagan achieved a unique feat by winning gold medals in both summer and winter sports. In 1920, he won the light-heavyweight boxing championship. Twelve years later, he appeared at the 1932 Winter Olympics and was a member of the 4-Man Bobsled team of Bill Frisk and won the four-man bobsleigh event.

Irish Americans have contributed to American sports since their arrival in the New World. Their descendants continue the legacy today, not only in the Olympics but in athletic teams, professional and amateur, throughout the United States of America.

"The Irish people help those in need"

"Good deeds make good neighbors." Our apologies to Robert Frost. The metropolitan Washington Irish community's bountiful generosity to those in need year after year is legendary. Whether the resources are time, money, or otherwise the Irish are quick to volunteer to help out individuals and families who have suffered setbacks.

The aftermath of Katrina presented a tremendous opportunity to help others. The devastation in New Orleans and along the Gulf Coast was pervasive and wide-spread, leaving families adrift in situations of homelessness, joblessness and in crisis. The destruction was indiscriminate, creating a physical and emotional loss to people of all races and socio-economic backgrounds.

Our country responded. Thousands of individuals volunteered their services, providing healthcare, shelter, food, clothing and jobs to people in need. This was accomplished by individual efforts, by organized groups and churches, and through established organizations such as the American Red Cross, Department of Homeland Security, Health and Human Services, Catholic Charities, and many, many more.

And so the Irish community responded to the crisis in the Gulf region. A member of the John Barry Division of the Ancient Order of Hibernians, Keith Carney, shared his first-hand experience of the devastation which shattered the town of Pass Christian, Mississippi, a Gulf town located about 75 miles east of New Orleans. Keith was sent on a mission by his parish in Alexandria, St. Mary's Church, which had collected funds for their sister parish of St Paul's Catholic Church and School located in Pass Christian. St. Paul's school had been totally destroyed by a 30 foot tidal surge during the storm, and all of the students were relocated to a crowded school nearby. Keith brought donations that would purchase trailers to serve as temporary

quarters for the 300 displaced students from kindergarten through fifth grade. Keith spent some time with Father Dennis Carver, the parish pastor, who himself was a life-long resident of this area and who was overwhelmed by the tragedies he had witnessed. Providing Christmas cards and gifts from the fifth graders at St. Mary's school to the children of St. Paul's, Keith's mission was accomplished. However, upon returning to Washington, DC, he shared the story of Pass Christian with his very sympathetic brother Hibernians.

The story of Danny Flaherty will illustrate the resourcefulness and the creativity of the Irish community as they provided assistance to their compatriot in his hour of need. Danny Flaherty, a former DC resident, owned and operated an Irish pub and restaurant in New Orleans, O'Flaherty's Pub, which was damaged by the flooding. He was forced to close his business when New Orleans was evacuated, moving to Texas. He and his staff were in dire need of financial assistance and he appealed to the Irish pub owners in Washington, DC for help. Fundraisers were offered: Mrs. O'Leary's pub in Gaithersburg, and Kitty O'Shea's pub in Arlington, VA. These pubs raised enough funds to help Danny reconstruct his life and the lives of many of his staff. Kitty O'Shea's pub, open for only a few months before the Katrina disaster, held a lively Guest bartender night in October, 2006. Eamon and Kirsten McCann, as well as a host of regular patrons, were able to raise \$800 in one night. Pubcian Danny McFadden of Falcarraja, Dorasgal, promised to add 50% of the final amount to the pot and proceeds were given to the American Red Cross.

In addition to their big hearts and warm welcomes, Irish pubs have always been creative in their efforts at fundraising for worthy causes. So, indeed, the pubs responded wholeheartedly to the crisis in the Gulf region. For example, Mackey's pub in Washington, DC sold raffle tickets dur-

ing football season. A reverse drawing was conducted on Superbowl Sunday so after great suspense, the winner was presented with a wide screen television, and the American Red Cross received \$3000.

Nanny O'Briens held a regular Monday night session and spread the word for all their regular musicians to play. The turnout was wonderful, the musicians played for a long night, and they were able to raise \$2136 which was donated to the American Red Cross.

The Irish Channel Restaurant in Washington, DC donated half of their sales for two days, and raised \$3000 for the American Red Cross.

And the Irish pubs are not finished! At this writing, a plan in the making involves cooperation with the larger community of Falls Church. Ireland's Four Provinces of Falls Church, VA plans to celebrate Mardi Gras on February 20, 2006 with a live band, and will charge a cover (which they never do) to be donated to these charities. Working with the Chamber of Commerce in Falls Church which

has established a task force to provide ongoing funding to Katrina victims, Colin Dillon has stepped up to the plate. The Falls Church Chamber of Commerce selected three charities: Hamestouch (a Falls Church organization which provides housing to women and families at risk); Crosslink International (provides medical supplies to help rebuild a clinic in New Orleans); and for a Falls Church relief fund established for public schools in St Bernard parish. Sally Cole, Executive Director of the Falls Church Chamber of Commerce, extends great praise to 4 P's and the Irish community for their efforts. "Colin Dillon is always supportive of his community", Ms Cole states.

These are some of the many efforts made by the Irish community during the aftermath of the Katrina disaster. Their grass roots effort came from the heart and they brought relief to thousands of people who were suffering from the effects of this terrible storm. We expect that efforts will continue as the Irish community can be depended on to come through when it counts.

The MCI Center hosts more than 220 sports, entertainment and cultural events each year.

O'Malley loves that she gets paid to do what other people can only do in their spare time. She advises young people

who want to get into her line of work to seek an internship in the field while they are in school, and find ways to distinguish themselves during that time.

O'Malley believes that continual learning is an important part of life. She is currently pursuing a law degree and expects to graduate next year. For two years, she taught a Sports Business Marketing class for seniors at the Georgetown University Business School. Combining lectures with visits by guest celebrities and seasoned veterans sports marketers, O'Malley taught these students what she knows best: how to run a successful sports franchise. Her efforts were recognized when Georgetown awarded her with the Adjunct Professor of the Year Award in 2002.

In spite of this hectic schedule, O'Malley has found time to share her marketing skills and expertise with a number of community organizations over the years. In 1997, she created the Americanism Award from the Alexandria-Olympic Boys and Girls Club. More recently, she is involved with the Juvenile Diabetes Foundation.

As an adult, O'Malley has been able to pursue her passion and attain her childhood dreams of a life in sports. Grace O'Malley would be proud.

Monaghan teams at both minor and senior levels, before his selection in 1958 to play goalkeeper on the Irish Youth Soccer Team, which faced off against England at Liverpool. The Dublin Sports Arena was host to a 1952 match between Dundalk and Cork United with Walter's team the clear victor over Cork playing before a packed house. He, along with all his teammates, received the "Cup Winner's Medal" for their stunning performance. Later that year Durkan playing for the Irish National Team, which shot out the United States 4-0 in exhibition play. Walter had established himself as a formidable soccer player by 1953 before turning professional at the Glenavon Soccer Club of Northern Ireland. Here he competed with distinction over the next four years, winning numerous awards for outstanding play. Gaelic football and soccer are in his genes. Walter's uncle was Captain of The All Ireland Football Team in 1921 and both Walter and his older brother have played professional football in Europe. While sports injuries curtailed Durkan's professional playing years in 1957, it did not slow his involvement in the sport. He continued amateur play in Washington and New York City leagues until the early 1960's, when he began officiating. One of Durkan's friends and teammate in DC football was the Irish writer, poet and singer Pete St. John. A writer known for many works, not least of which, is "Fields of Athenry", which has become an anthem for the masses in much the same way as the Corries' "Flower of Scotland" is considered the unofficial National anthem of the Scots.

It was quite a transition shifting from player to official, but Durkan brought an insight few possess. Referees are responsible for maintaining a safe playing environment and enforcing the rules of the game. A referee is expected to maintain calm impartiality. Among children and sometimes adults referees provide adult supervision. Referees are constantly making public decisions that are under critical review by passionate crowds. Any decision generally upsets at least half the spectators.

Durkan began officiating in Washington in 1964 before turning professional in 1967 with the founding of the North American Soccer League. This gentleman officiated at games involving Pele, Maradona, Cruyff, Beckenbauer and other world class players. Officiating was rewarding, demanding and required extensive travel during his 13 years of refereeing in the league, before retiring in 1980.

The Maryland State Soccer Association is a volunteer organization founded in 1927. As the governing body of amateur soccer in the state of Maryland, the MSSA mission is to promote and foster soccer in the state. The MSSA, its leagues, clubs and teams are members of the United States Soccer Federation (USSF) and the United States Adult Soccer Association (USASA). The USSF is a member of both the Fédération Internationale de Football Association (FIFA) and the U.S. Olympic Committee (USOC). The bottom line is that we provide opportunities for adults to continue playing the game they love. There is no reason to quit after your adolescent years. That is why our motto is Still Getting Our Kicks.

Walter E. Durkan was the recipient of the Grady Kraft Trophy in 1996 presented by the Maryland State Soccer Association in recognition of his years of dedicated service in the State of Maryland. The Award is named in honor of Grady Kraft, a former FIFA Referee who is a member of the United States and Maryland Soccer Hall of Fame. Walter has stayed active in the sports community by coaching St. Camillus soccer for 11 years and producing two championship teams. A coach meets the kids, learns their names, shares their joys and stands with them when they loose. Kids will remember the names of their favorite coach years after they stop playing, because they learned so much more than the game.

Walter Durkan is a truly gracious and accomplished gentleman and we proudly honor him this St. Patrick's Day.


